Stephen William Hawking was born in Oxford, England on January 8, 1942. Stephen enjoyed mathematics and science in school where he earned the nickname "Einstein." At University College, Oxford Stephen was awarded a first class honours degree in Natural Science. He then moved on to research Cosmology at Cambridge University. To date, Professor Hawking has 12 honorary degrees, is the recipient of many awards and prizes and was awarded a CBE in 1982. Whilst working on his PhD at Cambridge University, he began to have health issues. A series of tests revealed that Hawking had a disease called Motor Neurone Disease. At the time, the doctors said he only had a few years to live. Despite this, Hawking has lived a full and productive life with the help of science and modern medicine. Professor Hawking is still an active part of Cambridge University and retains an office at the Department for Applied Maths and Theoretical Physics.
